

Phoenix Elementary School District #1 Timeline

1870s

- 1871 May 5, Phoenix Elementary School District officially created
- 1871 November 27, first day of school. Used the courtroom in Hancock-Monihan Building (NW corner of Washington & Montezuma- now 1st Street)
- Paul Laurence Dunbar, a poet was born (1872)
- 1873 First permanent building...the Little Adobe (Between Central & 1st Ave & Van Buren & Monroe)
- Phoenix Elementary School District officially created May 15, 1871
- 20 students started school in Phoenix on November 27, 1871
- Block 92 of original townsite donated to school district (between Van Buren and Monroe and Central and 1st Avenue
- Little Adobe school house opened with W.A. Glover as teacher in January 1873
- Miss Nellie Shaver hired as teacher in November 1873. She was paid \$100/month
- \$10,000 bond for new school in 1879

1880s

- **1880** Central School replaces Little Adobe
- 1889 East End School (NE corner 8th Street & Washington)
- 1889 West End School (Madison Street between 6th & 7th Avenues)
- School closed in March 1883 due to a smallpox epidemic School re-opens in 1885 with 374 pupils
- School re-opens in 1885 with 374 pupils
- Seven teachers and one principal hired for 1888 school year
- The Statue of Liberty is dedicated in New York Harbor (1886)
- Phoenix incorporated as a city (1881)
- Phoenix became capital of Arizona Territory (1889)

1890s

- 1899 Five Points School (7th Ave & Woodland) Prospective teachers required to pass an examination to qualify for employment.
- Mule-drawn street cars replaced by electric street cars in 1893
- The four schools in the district served students within specific boundaries.
- Telephones come to Phoenix (1891)
- First Public Library opens in Phoenix (1898)

1900s

- 1902 General Clark Churchill House. Shared building with high school students. Became McKinley School (on 5th St and McKinley)
- 1902 Linville School (Lincoln between 1st & 2nd streets) later site of School District Admin Building
- 1909 Millard Fillmore School (741 W. Fillmore)
- President McKinley assassinated in 1901
- President Theodore Roosevelt signs Reclamation Act in 1902
- Construction of Roosevelt Dam begins in 1905
- The Salt River Water Users Association, now SRP, formed in 1903
- First automobile arrives in Phoenix (1900)



1920s

- 1920 East Lake School (1709 & 1713 E. Washington)
- 1920 Grand Avenue School (an independent school district that joined PESD in 1943) (Wilshire & 23rd Ave)
- 1920 Kenilworth School (5th Ave & W. Moreland)
- 1920 9th Avenue School (9th Ave & Sherman)
- 1921 Jefferson School replaces East Lake School (1510 E. Jefferson)
- 1921 Henry Wadsworth Longfellow School (18th Street & Adams)
- 1921 Ralph Waldo Emerson School (7th Street & Palm Lane)
- 1921 Sherman School closes
- Jackson Pollock, an American Painter, enrolled in 6th grade at Monroe School (1923)
- 1925 9th Ave School rebuilt and renamed Paul Lawrence Dunbar School (707 W. Grant)
- 1925 James Russell Lowell School (1121 S. 3rd Avenue)
- 1926 Benjamin Franklin School (1645 W. McDowell)
- 1928 "New" Booker T. Washington School (1201 E. Washington)
- 1928 Henshaw and Lower Henshaw Schools (14th St & Henshaw [now Buckeye Rd])
- 1928 Jefferson School closes
- 1929 Robert Louis Stevenson School replaces Henshaw and Lower Henshaw Schools (1801 S. 12th St)
- 1929 John Greenleaf Whittier School (2000 N. 16th Street)
- The Orpheum Theater opened in January 1929

The stock market crashed (1929)

- Pan American Airways launched the first international flight (1927)
- Charles Lindberg completed the first solo flight across the Atlantic (1927)

Sky Harbor Airport opened in 1929

1910s

- 1911 George Washington School replaces East End School (910 E. Washington)
- 1911 John Adams School (800 W. Adams)
- 1911 Martin Van Buren School (1650 W. Van Buren)
- 1912 Andrew Jackson School (w Madison between 6 & 7th avenues)
- 1912 Ulysses S. Grant School (415 W. Grant)
- 1912 Martin Van Buren School renamed Capitol School (named at statehood) (1650 W. Van Buren)
- 1912 West End School closes
- 1912 William McKinley School opens (512 E. Pierce) (previously omitted)
- 1913 Fredrick Douglas School (520 E. Madison)
- 1913 Sherman School (248 W. Sherman)
- **1913** James Abram Garfield School (921 N. 13th St)
- 1914 James Monroe School (Southeast corner of 7th Street and Van Buren)
- 1917 District Administration Building (331 N. 1st Ave)
- 1917 Central School closes
- Arizona becomes the 48th state in the Union, February 14, 1912
- Governor George W. P. Hunt elected first governor
- Women given the right to vote in Arizona elections, November 5, 1912
- Gideon Sundback of Hoboken patents the all-purpose zipper (1913)
- The Great War (WWI) officially ends November 11, 1918
- Roosevelt Dam is completed (1911)
- Spanish Flu pandemic (1918)
- Grand Canyon National Park was created (1919)



1930s

Discovery of Pluto at Lowell Observatory February 16, 1930

Boulder Dam completed (1936) There were 20 schools in the PESD #1 system in 1931 North High School opened (1939)

1940s

- 1943 Fredrick Douglas School closes
- 1945 Mary McLeod Bethune School (1310 S. 15th Avenue)
- 1947 Abraham Lincoln School rebuilt on new site (11th St & Henshaw)
- 1947 District Administration moves to new site (Old Lincoln, 125 E. Lincoln)
- 1948 Thomas Alva Edison School (910 N 18th Street)
- 1949 Monterey Park School (Northeast corner of 3rd St & Oak)
- Pearl Harbor is bombed by the Japanese December 7, 1941
- Silvestre S. Herrera received the Congressional Medal of Honor (1945)
- Harmon Park opens (1948)
- In the Spring of 1941, there were 318 teachers in the PESD#1 system
- KPHO-TV first Phoenix TV Station (1948)

1950s

- 1951 Adeline Gray School opens (201 E. Durango)
- 1952 Maie Bartlett Heard School opens (2301 W. Thomas Rd)
- 1952 John Adams School renamed Grace Court
- 1957 Silvestre Santana Herrera School (1350 S. 11th Street)
- 1958 George Washington School renamed Faith North School

Disneyland opened in 1955

The first plastic Hula Hoop was manufactured (1958)

Wallace and Ladmo show began April 1, 1954

Park Central Mall opened (1957)

Brown vs. Board of Education (1954)

Jack Williams served on the PESD#1 school board (1951-1954) becoming Phoenix mayor in 1955

1960s

1960 – Robert Louis Stevenson School renamed Ann Ott Elementary School

- President John F. Kennedy was assassinated November 22, 1963
- Barry Goldwater (Kenilworth alum) ran for President of the US (1964)

Martin Luther King spoke at ASU and Tanner Chapel (1964) Jack Williams becomes Governor of Arizona (1966)

Phoenix Suns Basketball team starts (1968)

Neil Armstrong became the first man to walk on the moon (1969)

PESD#1 has 25 schools

1970s

- 1972 James Monroe School closes
- 1974 William McKinley School closes
 - 1976 Grace Court School closes
 - 1977 Andrew Jackson School closes
 - 1977 Accelerated Learning Procedures opens at Monterey Park School
 - 1979 Faith North School Closes
 - Phoenix Elementary School District #1 celebrates 100 years of service to Phoenix students (1971)
 - Valley Bank Center (now Chase Tower) opened in 1973, the tallest building in Arizona
 - The first Star Wars movie opened in May 1977

Caesar Chavez fasted 24 days for farm workers' rights, Santa Rita Hall, Phoenix (1972)

Margaret Hance, a Kenilworth alum, becomes first female mayor of Phoenix (1976)

Raul Hector Castro elected governor of Arizona 1974

1980s

- 1981 Augustus H. Shaw School (13th St & Washington)
- 1981 "Old" Ralph Waldo Emerson School renamed Emerson Court (7th Street & Palm Lane)
- 1981 "New" Ralph Waldo Emerson school located just east of original site (915 E. Palm Lane)
- 1985 Abraham Lincoln School closes
- Pope John Paul II comes to Phoenix (1987)
- The Cardinals moved to Phoenix from St. Louis (1988)
- Sandra Day O'Connor appointed to the US Supreme Court (1981)

Palo Verde Nuclear Generating Plant opens (1986) Phoenix Grand Prix held in downtown Phoenix (1989)

1990s

- 1990 District Administration offices open in Emerson Court
- 1992 Phoenix Preparatory Academy (Southeast corner 7th St and Fillmore)
- 1997 Magnet Traditional School replaces Grand Avenue School (2602 N 23rd Avenue)
- Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone was first published in the US (1998)
- The temperature hit 120 degrees in Phoenix June 25, 1990
- The final section of I-10 through Arizona completed in August 1990
- The first MP3 player was created (1997) Tempe Lake is completed (1999)

2000s

- 2001 Adeline Gray School closes
- 2003 Faith North Montessori opens (910 E. Washington)
- 2005 Ann Ott School closes
- 2009 Phoenix Preparatory Academy became ASU Preparatory Academy

2010s

- 2016 Shaw Montessori School opens
- 2016 Faith North Early Childhood Learning Center opens (new info)
- 2018 Accelerated Learning Procedures Closes at Monterey Park School

The Musical Instrument Museum (MIM) opens (2010) Zoom was launched in 2013

Superbowl XLIX held in University of Phoenix Stadium (2015)

2020s

2021 – Phoenix iAcademy opens
